OVERVIEW

The U.S. has a national interest in a free and peaceful Europe, which must include a stable, democratic and market-oriented Belarus. Now that the

European Union shares a border with Belarus, it has launched the Eastern Partnership initiative to bring Belarus, together with other Newly Independent States, in closer cooperation with Europe. Belarus' current authorities have stifled independent media and political opposition and have carried out questionable economic policies. Some positive but still reversible steps were taken by the authorities in the direction of U.S. and EU human rights concerns and creating fora for dialogue with civil society and democratic forces. Structural

reforms and privatization remain on the agenda, though some measures were recently undertaken to liberalize the economy and continue privatization. The current global economic crisis may provide new incentives for structural reforms. In its internal policies, Belarus continues to be a difficult environment for non-governmental organizations (NGOs), opposition parties, and free media. The country retains the potential to contribute to and benefit from regional economic development, but it needs to implement democratic and market reforms. USAID focuses on empowering Belarusians so that they may participate in the reform and transition processes.

PROGRAMS

ENGAGE CITIZENS IN POLITICAL AND SOCIAL DECISION-MAKING

Independent NGOs are under constant government scrutiny in Belarus. USAID provides support, training, and expert advice to help sustain NGOs, independent trade unions, and legal assistance providers; it also works to improve their advocacy capacity. USAID promotes the rule of law by training lawyers, activists, and NGOs in human rights. Support is also provided to defend civil activists from illegal government actions. USAID conducts international exchanges for Belarusian professionals, NGO leaders, entrepreneurs, and local government workers to promote mutual understanding through exposure to democratic and market-based societies.

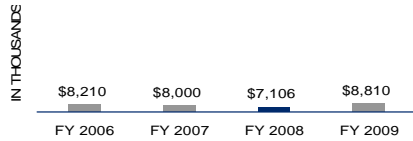


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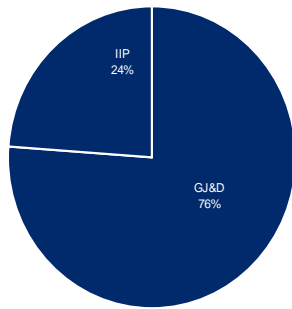

For over a decade, USAID has supported business education development in Belarus. One long-term impact of this support can be seen in the creation of three separate business education programs and bringing these schools to international standards. USAID capitalizes on successful experiences helping launch a western-style MBA program. USAID also supports a coalition of reform-minded business associations and other NGOs to advance ideas of free-market and democratic principles within Belarusian society. Their advocacy efforts with the Belarusian government have led to improving the business environment.

The government has limited people's access to independent print media and attempts to control electronic media. USAID focuses on strengthening the media's ability to provide citizens with objective, fact-based, and useful information. USAID works with independent print and electronic media, including internet resources, cross-border radio, and TV.

USAID works with democratically oriented political parties to improve their ability to recruit and retain members, plan and manage campaigns, and build coalitions. Special attention is given to help political parties improve their outreach and public relations skills to communicate better with citizens and the media; this enables them to more effectively represent citizens, and counteract the isolation imposed by the authorities.

SUPPORT IMPROVED SOCIAL SERVICES AND HEALTH

USAID seeks to improve the level of healthcare and social protection for Belarusians to improve community-based services for vulnerable groups, such as children and people with disabilities, and people in Chernobyl-affected areas. USAID is supporting a Global Fund grant to Belarus to fight Belarus' rising infection rates of TB through developing protocols for TB treatment, improvements in the health system, and training for medical professionals.

USAID works to prevent child abuse and neglect, and reduce the number of children living in state-run institutions. It helps develop methodologies, supports adoptive families, and trains parents and service providers in proper child care. USAID engages people with disabilities and supports efforts to increased awareness of their rights and freedom. Assistance to NGOs that unite and represent people with disabilities helps build their ability to advocate for the interests and basic human rights of their constituencies.

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
