Food Security Situation*

- The 2010 *UNDP Human Development Index* ranks Djibouti 147 out of 169 countries. Population of approx. 818,200 depends almost entirely on imported food.
- Djibouti has a climate unsuited to production of crops other than small amounts of vegetables. Rural populations depend primarily on livestock. Erratic rainfall has led to a continuing drought, causing alarming food shortages and high levels of malnutrition.
- Pastoralists in the northwest and southeast border pastoral zones currently face significant survival and livelihood protection deficits due to severe rainfall deficits over the last two years and high staple food prices.
- Djibouti is host to over 20,000 refugees, mostly from Somalia. The ongoing arrival of refugees has increased needs in all sectors in the overcrowded camp. Poor water supplies have resulted in sanitation problems.
