## FOOD FOR PEACE – FY 2010 PROGRAMS

USAID’s Office of Food for Peace responds to global food insecurity by providing emergency food assistance to help people affected by conflict and natural disasters. Food for Peace also provides longer-term development food assistance, such as to support nutrition and agriculture programs, to address the underlying causes of hunger.

In FY 2010, Food for Peace provided approximately 2.1 million metric tons of Title II food aid as part of programs valued at approximately \$1.9 billion in 46 countries.

In addition, Food for Peace provided \$244 million in grants in 8 countries for local and regional procurement of food commodities, food vouchers and cash transfers under the new Emergency Food Security Program. This program is used primarily when U.S.-purchased Title II food aid cannot arrive fast enough to respond to an emergency or when local procurement, cash transfers or food voucher programs may be more appropriate than U.S. in-kind food aid due to local market conditions.
